
Harvest Thanksgiving

Bible Reading: Deuteronomy 26:1-11

First Fruits and Tithes

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, ² you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³ You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' ⁴ When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, ⁵ you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶ When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard

labour on us, ⁷ we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. ⁸ The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; ⁹ and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰ So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. ¹¹ Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Reflection

I think this is a lovely reading for harvest, full of thanksgiving and hope for the future. In great gratitude the people who have settled and worked the land take their first fruits of the harvest in offering to the house of God. They thank God for their crops and produce, whilst remembering when things weren't so good for their people, when they were enslaved, mistreated and not free to prosper. In remembering this and the wonders of God which led to their freedom, they then celebrate God's bounty with all the people, including at God's bequest the aliens, foreigners, immigrants of the land.

Gratitude is at the heart of harvest. Gratitude to God for all of nature's resources and elements needed for growth. Gratitude to those who work and tend the land, or go to sea. Gratitude to the suppliers and distributers, producers, food workers- that huge chain from seed to table.

I was touched by a recent Facebook post by Hannah (who has reflected for us before) and the positive comments that followed. Hannah talked of the 'whiffy' smell of manure and how rather than it being an annoyance it reminds her of the richness of the countryside around us, and of how hard our farmers work to produce food for us all, putting in long, long hours. You don't have to go far here at the moment to see field after field harvested and that wonder of what crop will be sown and appear there next.

Harvest Festival, concentrates our thanks for the multitudes and varieties of foods we eat; the treasures harvested of the year and importantly it also prays for, points us to the new sowing and planting - the hope of the next year- as the cycle begins again. It also encourages us to remember and provide for, for those who don't celebrate a harvest or enjoy food on the table.

This week saw the last of the Churches Together Food Parcels go out to local families in need over the extended summer, ahead of schools return. 91 families received parcels, with 59 volunteers (including a number from our Churches. Thank-you.) who made the project possible. Foodbank hopes to continue to offer support where it is needed.

According to UNICEF (2018) approximately 3.1 million children die from undernutrition each year. Hunger and undernutrition contributes to more than half of global child deaths, as it can also make children more vulnerable to illness and disease.

There is enough food to feed the word if it was shared more equally. Mahatma Ghandi famously said "The world has enough for everyone's need, but not enough for everyone's greed."

Biblically, Harvest is about tending, thankfulness and sharing. Landowners are asked to leave some of the outer crop in the field for others who have little to harvest for themselves. Harvest reminds us that we are fed through the hard work of farmers and others, of ourselves if we grow some produce, but ultimately it is God's generous provision and gifts to us which makes it all possible, and in acknowledgement of this we should as generously pass excess on to those in need.

There is a tale about an elderly woman who was poor. She prayed to God and God gave her 10 apples. This was wonderful. 'Now I can get the things I need,' she said. She was so hungry of course that she ate the first three apples and so was full. The next three apples she traded for some shelter so that she could be safe from the rain and the sun. She exchanged the next three apples for some clothes, so she was no longer cold at night. But there was then one apple left over. 'Why did you give me one more apple than I needed?' she asked God. God replied, 'So you too can share'.

May we always be thankful to God for the harvest, and generous in sharing our windfalls with others. **Amen**
