Bible Reading: Matthew 16:13-20

When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets."

He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven."

Reflection

Today we are asked a big question of our faith. Who do you say Jesus is?

Helpfully for us (well me!!) Peter has already given a 'perfect' answer, so just assume we too have answered equally as eloquently! And then consider what first comes to your mind if you are asked who Jesus is.

Is it a Wikipedia historical type answer or something more relational?

Would it be a different answer depending on who you were with or how you were feeling?

What if we were to rephrase the question to be more personal and ask 'What does Jesus mean to you?'. Would you recall times when you have cried recognising your part in Jesus' death upon the cross? Would you recall his presence surrounding you when you were in uttermost despair? Would you smile as you recall a time of certainty and perfect peace in the knowledge that the full trinity of God loves you?

There is Church history and there is the personal history of our faith, we all have a 'catholic' and own story to tell.

I have been watching 'Vikings' on Amazon Prime and am intrigued by the depiction of the 'Christian' and 'Pagan' characters, and how their faith in their God or gods is so central to their life, their battles and their death. It is the guide by which they lead their lives and measure their failures. It is upmost in their minds.

I wonder if we can we say the same? Has Jesus – your faith made a personal difference to your life, your thoughts, your hopes, your plans?

Pastor Michael Marsh says 'Jesus' life and presence among us calls into question everything about our lives, our world, the status quo, and business as usual. That's why we ought not answer his question too quickly, too glibly, or with too much certainty. It's not a question to be figured out as much as it is a question to be lived'.

Might that be what Jesus was getting at, for them , for us, to acknowledge a living God and a living faith that makes a difference in how we live our life. The 'key' to our life on which everything else is built?

It is notable I think that Jesus asks them what others say, but then quickly moves it back to them as individuals 'who do *you* say that I am?'. Our community of faith and the Creeds that we say together are important, but here Jesus puts emphasises on our individual response and declaration. It is not a biblical test but rather an examination of our hearts beliefs. Who or what is it that we put first in our life? What are the most important things to us? How courageous are we to visibly and verbally own our faith?

The early 20 Century Christian Pastor A.W. Tozer said 'It is not what a man does that determines whether his work is sacred or secular, it is why he does it."

Is God in our reasonings and our actions as we go through each day, or neatly packaged away for high days and holy days?

A dear Christian friend who had endured many tragedies in his lifetime replied when I asked him about his enduring faith 'Nikki, if I wake up in the morning I praise God and say to him 'what are we doing together today then?"

May our Saviour, our faith, be joyfully embodied in the whole person that we are. Amen.
