Bible Reading: Matthew 14:13-21

Jesus withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Reflection

Many biblical scenes are set in desert like places they are often times of exile, deep reflection and revelation. Aside from Jesus' death and resurrection, this familiar miracle of Jesus feeding the 5,000 is significantly the only one recorded in all four of the Gospels.

Theologian Marilyn Salmon suggests the real "miracle" is not so much about the multiplication of the food, but how Jesus' presence and actions blesses those who have come to him. Rather than being sent away to go and find their own food, they are invited to take a seat on the grass, to make themselves comfortable, as if they truly are Jesus' invited guests. Then in front of them all he holds the bread up to heaven and blesses it. This blessed bread is then distributed to all present, and you can't help but see an early enactment of the Eucharist.

Maybe they were expecting just a morsel shared amongst so many, and you can just image their awe when they look down and see there is still as much in the basket as before, generous amounts. People can have their fill and still there is baskets left over! From barely nothing, in Jesus' presence, all are generously fed.

It is notable that although Jesus could have dramatically said 'multiply' and crowds would have gasped as he performed the miracle and be in no doubt about his power. As is his nature it is not about use or abuse of power, indeed we see this characteristic most poignantly on the cross where he rejects all his angelic privilege to be the vulnerable, the abused, the discriminated. In a gentle, spiritual moment he holds the bread up to heaven and speaks words of blessing.

I wonder if you had been watching what you might have felt, and pondered on in the months ahead. And how you might have felt on hearing the news of his crucifixion and whether you would have felt that goodness had been lost..

But for now, you can just hear the crowds laughter and chatter as they share the overflowing baskets of nourishment The children would have been playing, maybe lifting the young boy who shared his lunch on their shoulders in thanks. In that moment there is joy and contentment. All is well.

May we all have moments of joy and contentedness this week. Amen
