Bible Reading Matthew 10:24-39

Jesus said to the twelve disciples, "A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household! "So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell.

Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows.

"Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

"Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and one's foes will be members of one's own household. Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

Reflection

That's uncomfortable reading! I am not sure if I am being reassured and encouraged, or warned and admonished? Probably both! I think God knows in our humanness we are at times weak and fearful in the face of tension and the unknown, but we are also brave and good and hunger for a better world.

Agonising fear and uncertainty; bravery and action. We have seen so many examples of these over recent weeks with the devastating pandemic and with the Black Lives Matter movement and calls for racial and social justice. We have seen frontline heroes, Captain Tom Moore's fundraising for the NHS, Marcus Rashford's stance and the stirring of a nation for free school meals and against child poverty.

In the reading I think we are being prepared to do the right thing, even if it costs us to do so. And if it does cost us, we are reassured in the knowledge that God, who knows the very number of hairs on our head, will never leave us or forsake us. No matter what happens if we stand up God has our soul and nothing or no one can take that away or destroy it.

Jesus recognizes that fear can stop us living out our best discipleship and a life of grace in the world. But why are we asked to cause unrest within our family? Well we know elsewhere we are commanded to love and honour our families, and to work for peace, so I don't read this as literal but rather a literary exaggeration to draw attention to a point, which I think is to warn us that worrying too much about what others even family might think or how they will react can hinder us from doing what is right and what God has called us to do. One day (hopefully in the very distant future!) we will all come before Gods throne, on our own, and although Jesus will understand our humanness with its failings and short comings, we don't really want to have to say "Yes I heard you calling but my husband/wife/child didn't really want me to 'welcome that stranger, give to a foodbank, go to Church, speak out against injustice, talk about God's healing grace in my life...". How much better to be able to stand boldly before God knowing we bravely did the best we could to serve God and one another and to make the world a better place?

I'll end with a quote from Bishop Desmond Tutu 'God's dream is that you and I and all of us will realize that we are family, that we are made for togetherness, for goodness, and for compassion'.
